Bond creates an atmosphere which is menacing. Thunder, lightning, whispering sounds and moreover figures seen by candlelight - all of these produce a story with supernatural elements. The way Bond represents his imagination is really terrific -

"One by one the clocks of the town struck midnight, when the sounds died away the deep silence of windless night fell again over everything...."

According to William Wordsworth, "a poet is a man speaking to men". Basically, there should not be any difference among the poets and common men. So, the use of simple, lucid

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and common language is permanent as well as philosophical. Ruskin Bond is immensely popular for his simple style of writing. Mr. Oliver shared the horrible incident With the watchman and the watchman replied, "Do you mean it is like this Sahib?" And he raised the lamp to his own face. The watchman had no eyes, no ears and no features at all, not even eyebrows. The wind blew the lamp out and Mr. Oliver had a heart attack. Thus, Bond talks about some unbelievable and supernatural phenomenon of people.
